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consciousness is the major unsolved problem in biology written as an introduction to the field and drawing upon clinical psychological and physiological observations this book seeks to answer questions of consciousness within a neuroscientific framework

nonphysical subjective conscious states christof koch has devoted much of his career to bridging the seemingly unbridgeable gap between the physics of the brain and phenomenal experience this engaging book part scientific overview part memoir part futurist speculation describes koch s search for an empirical explanation for consciousness koch recounts not only the birth of the modern science of consciousness but also the subterranean motivation for his quest his instinctual if romantic belief that life is meaningful koch describes his own groundbreaking work with francis crick in the 1990s and 2000s and the gradual emergence of consciousness once considered a fringy subject as a legitimate topic for scientific investigation present at this paradigm shift were koch and a handful of colleagues including ned block david chalmers stanislas dehaene giulio tononi wolf singer and others aiding and abetting it were new techniques to listen in on the activity of individual nerve cells clinical studies and brain imaging technologies that allowed safe and noninvasive study of the human brain in action koch gives us stories from the front lines of modern research into the neurobiology of consciousness as well as his own reflections on a variety of topics including the distinction between attention and awareness the unconscious how neurons respond to homer simpson the physics and biology of free will dogs der ring des nibelungen sentient machines the loss of his belief in a personal god and sadness all of them are signposts in the pursuit of his life s work to uncover the roots of consciousness

the eternal silence at the core of our being can manifest itself as inner awareness or as a source of inspiration for our active lives meditation is a path that allows us not only to grow inwardly but also to develop maturity and perfect our outer lives to answer the question what are you doing with your life we must first examine the role our mind plays in guiding our thoughts and actions this book explores the role of the mind in our lives and offers strategies for achieving inner silence drawing inspiration from the methods of raja yoga kriya yoga tantra yoga and the yoga of sri aurobindo it thus complements the first volume devoted to mastering the life force prana and explores the evolution of consciousness as the origin means and ultimate goal

building upon insights from the sixteenth century neo confucian wang yang ming the american pragmatist john dewey and the process philosopher alfred north whitehead this book argues that knowledge is best understood as a form of action many of the most puzzling philosophic problems in the modern era can be traced to our tendency to assume that knowledge is separate from action letting go of

the sharp knowledge action distinction however makes possible a more coherent theory of knowledge that is more adaptive to the way we experience one another the world and ourselves by responding directly to problems raised by contemporary thinkers like charles taylor donald davidson richard rorty daniel dennett mark johnson george lakoff and robert neville this book maps out a strategy for making progress in the contemporary quest for a nonrepresentational theory of knowledge

as an introduction to the work of renowned philosopher eric voegelin consciousness and transcendence stands out as the first book to examine voegelin s work from a theological perspective although voegelin considered himself a philosopher the incorporation of christian theological themes is pervasive throughout his work and in this volume michael p morrissey clearly illustrates that voegelin s thought is as relevant to theology as it is to the disciplines philosophy history and political science in which it has traditionally been confined morrissey focuses on and traces the development of voegelin s theory of consciousness demonstrating that it makes a tremendous theological contribution but also presents a radical challenge to theology this challenge is based on the nature of voegelin s method of meditative experiential exegesis voegelin s lifelong search for order in both its transcendent and immanent dimensions was truly an interdisciplinary inquiry into the nature of reality and as such it serves as an integrative model of what the human sciences are truly about in an age of dogmatism and ideology consequently morrissey illustrates voegelin s thought not only results in a reunification of philosophy and theology it also succeeds in reconstructing theology on a broader and deeper scale of inquiry than is generally practiced today consciousness and transcendence includes a lengthy comparison of voegelin s thought to that of another seminal thinker jesuit theologian bernard lonergan and is the only book that focuses on voegelin s last writings for those who are new to voegelin s thought this volume serves as an up to date introduction to his challenging body of work for those already familiar with voegelin it provides elucidation and commentary on his most important ideas and concepts especially in regard to his later more theological writings

an outgrowth of dosse s history of structuralism empire of meaning is an extended encounter with some of the most influential french intellectuals through interviews and readings dosse reveals what has become of the intellectuals of the generation of 68 as they have tried to work out the implications of their revolt against structuralism and the problem of cold war existence paul ricoeur bruno

this book contains all the known published and unpublished essays by s bodhesako beginnings change the buddha and catch 22 the myth of sisyphus faith and being and craving in the first essay beginnings the author discusses the authenticity and relevance of the buddhist canon the second essay change investigates the concepts of change impermanence and time in relation to experience and argues against equating them with the concept of flux or continuous change in the third essay the buddha and catch 22 the similarities between joseph heller s novel and the buddha s teaching are discussed the next essay the myth of sisyphus is a buddhist reinterpretation of the greek myth of sisyphus which is symbolizing the endless recurring nature of our tasks ven bodhesako also discusses albert camus interpretation of this myth the essay faith investigates the relevance of faith in the buddha s teaching while the last essay being and craving deals with the buddhist concept of craving and its traditional interpretation

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
